The Artistic Director



Shu-Chen Cuff was born in Kaohsiung,
Taiwan where she established a wellrounded background in dance with training
in Ballet, Modern, Chinese Opera
movements, and various Chinese folk
dances. She immigrated to United States
to continue her training and pursue her
dance journey. Shu-Chen performed
numerous classical and contemporary works
while dancing with the Miami Ballet and
Nevada Ballet Theater. After relocating to
the Washington, DC area in 2002, Shu-Chen

worked with Dana Tai Soon Burgess Dance Company and has left her footprints around the world, touring to Asia, Central America, and Europe. Shu-Chen has also performed at the International Dance Festival in Japan, Malaysia, and Taiwan.

With her strong desire of creating refreshing and vitalizing works for the community, Shu-Chen established Gin Dance Company in 2011. Shu-Chen's works have been featured on FOX5 DC News as well as numerous publications including the Washington Post, Washingtonian, Capital Hill Rag Magazine, Washington Flyer Magazine, Northern Virginia Magazine, Reston Connection, MetroDC Theater Arts, and Shu-Chen was a featured model for Summer Chic Fashions at Lincoln Theatre with Washington Life Magazine. In 2017, Shu-Chen collaborated with two-time Grammy nominee, David Taylor. Shu-Chen had an exclusive radio interview with Denise Turney. Shu-Chen also has been a Finalist in the category of Outstanding Choreographer and Outstanding Individual Performer at the Dance MetroDC Awards and is a recipient of the Strauss Artist Grant by the Arts Council of Fairfax County and has served on the Board of Director of Dance MetroDC.







小費工漲薪案 市議會駁回

「Initiative 77」原定10月9日起實施 公聽會激辯16小時夭折

今年稍早由華府選民投票通過的 小費工漲薪案「Initiative 77」, 2日在華府市議會遭駁回: 該案原本 從10月9日起實施,規定在2026年之 前,把華府拿小費員工的最低時薪 從現在的3.33元提高到普通最低時 萊標準的15元,但因餐飲業者強烈 反彈而引來市議會二次討論: 駁回 後市議會會繼續考慮替代析衷案。 「Initiative 77」提出後,華府餐飲業老闆 及行業組織曾籌款35萬元,發動「救救我們 的小費」(Save Our Tips)活動來反對提案, 並在餐館門口貼出「Vote No on 77」的標語 ,不過該案遭是在6月以55%的支持率獲得 通過;其中華府西部富裕區的變民幾乎都投 反對票,而阿納克斯蒂亞河(Anacostia River) 以東的貧困區,六成孆民投支持票。

該案計畫消除華府的最低時薪雙軌系統, 將小費工與普通勞工的時薪標準均提高到15 元,但華府餐館協會及業主乃至許多小費工 ,擔心「Initiative 77」將導致價格升高、解 僱潮和門店倒閉,表示原先小費工特有的時 薪系統,才能幫助原本利潤微薄的餐飲業良 好運轉。

但支持「Initiative 77」的維權團體引述行 業審計表示,部分小費工因為這一特殊時薪 系統,未能獲得法定支薪,尤其女侍應生有 時為了小費,還得忍受食客騷擾;支持者說 ,統一提高時薪,就能最大限度規避這些行 業不規範。

經過激烈辯論和長達16小時的「Initiative

77」公聽會,市議會終在2日以8比5的投票 駁回該案。

支持駁回的市議員表示,該法案的用詞極 誤導人,許多投了贊成票的選民可能因為誤 導,而未發覺「Initiative 77」會加重小商業 主負擔,迫使他們提高餐飲價格,或通過裁 員來支付高昂的勞工成本。

同時,駁回案也需市長包瑟(Muriel Bowser)簽字才能生效,但包瑟此前多次表 態反對「Initiative 77」,拒簽駁回案的可能 性極低。

上山下鄉50周年 知青團圓憶當年

「小小的聯歡會,開成了一部史詩。」在 「上山下鄉」50周年之際,曾見證這段歷史 的大華府知責們聚集一堂,紀念活動

知識青年「上山下郷」是1968年底因著毛 澤東指示「知識青年到農村,接受貧下中農 再教育」而全國限開,當年在校的初、高中 生幾乎全前往農村,總計,文革中上山下鄉 的知青人數達到1600多萬人,包括了華府知 青協會的200多會員。

I came to this country because

I came to this country because I was so drawn to Western culture and, most particularly, Western dance. All the beautiful and elegant classical ballets: "Swan Lake," "Sleeping Beauty," "Romeo and Juliet" and the wide range of styles of modern dance, from Martha Graham and Jose Limon to Paul Taylor and so many other unique styles of movement. Coming from Taiwan, where I had been trained in all different types of Chinese folk dances and Chinese operatic movements, I had the same desire... I wanted to come to the U.S. to do it all: ballet, modern dance and jazz, My amazing parents made my dream come true! I came to the U.S. to study dance at the University of Florida's New World School of the Arts. Upon graduation, I was fortunate to be offered a position at Nevada Ballet Theatre, where I danced for five years. After relocating to D.C. in 2002, I began a 9-year affiliation with DTSB Dance Company, which toured internationally. In 2011, my husband, Gary Cuff, and I started our own dance company called Gin Dance Company, GDC). As the artistic director of Gin Dance Company, I began creating work that reflected my unique dance heritage, a kind of East/West fusion. My work blends Eastern philosophy and gesturing with Western fluidity of movement. It wasn't a conscious decision; it's just what comes out of me when I start choreographing. The most challenging obstacle I faced when I first came to U.S. was the language bar-rier. The most helpful source

was meeting my husband, Gary. Prior to that, even after I went to college and later danced with professional dance companies in the U.S., my language skills were still not very good. In retrospect, I think it was because all that ironal was mostly using body language. I think it was because all that time I was mostly using body lan-guage – dance – to communicate. There were some occasions when I didn't know that the words I was saying didn't make sense or might even come across as rude to others. I was just simply translating words from Chinese to English in my head and saying them. Often people were too polite to correct me, but Gary


really helped me in this area. He taught me so much about American communication and culture. Good communication is so important, and I feel fortunate to have been helped

When I first interviewed Shu-Chen Cuff a few years, she said that "through dance, we deliver our ideas, stories, and emotions across without saying a word. Regardless what country you are from and what language you speak, the audience can hear your voice by watching the body movements expressing with a different rhythm, different energy, and different dynamic."

When I asked why audiences hunger for dance, Cuff described it this way; "We all live in a stressed filled world. Watching dance is a great way to unplug for a couple of hours and lose ourselves in the moment. A moment filled with beautiful and intricate movement set to music that touches our soul. It reminds us of dreams that we once had and possibilities that still lie ahead."

Her words made quite an impression on me.

Gin Dance will be returning to Atlas' Intersections Festival this year for a performance of an imaginative dance program called *Hear Me Now* on March 7th at 4:30 p.m. The 2015 Intersection Festival is bringing together over 100 performing arts groups in a multi-week arts festival through March 7th.

I interviewed Shu-Chen Cuff, the Artistic Director of the Gin Dance Company.

David Siegel: For those not familiar with Gin Dance Company, how would you describe your choreography "style"?



Shu-Chen Cuff: I've had some big influences in my dance life that have certainly contributed to and helped shape my choreographic style. In Taiwan, where I was born and raised, I studied Chinese Folk Dance and Opera Movements along with Ballet and Modern Dance. From that heritage, it would be hard to deny a strong Eastern influence in my choreography. In the States, I went much deeper into Ballet, Modern, and Jazz.

The short answer to the question is that my Choreography style is a fusion of eastern gesturing with western fluidity of movement

and, while modern in styling, certainly with a contemporary balletic feel to it. I work very hard to do very different types of works to continually challenge myself and my dancers as well as maintaining a fresh new look for audiences.


What do you look for in dancers for your Gin Dance Company compositions?


Besides having strong technique, I also look for the dancers who have the drive and passion to keep learning, growing, taking on challenges and who can easily adapt to the new style of the piece and can offer their unique artistry to each work and make it their own. Character development is just as important as strong technique in creating a fulfilling rich experience for the audience.



What inspired development of your newest work Motion in String?

For some of my works, I have the inspiration for the piece, a particular story, message, or movement first. For *Motion in String*, the inspiration started when I first heard the music. This recomposed score from Antonio Vivaldi's *The Four Seasons* by Max Richter kept the classical feel from the original, but enhanced it with a strong edgy tone giving it a unique modern flavor that I really fell in love with. The music is rich and expressive with emotions and feelings. When I first heard the music, the movements and the vision of the work had penetrated my mind. I had to create the piece.

How would you describe the score for Motion in String?

Motion in String is assembled with four sections with very different rhythm and dynamics to the music in each moment. The score is recomposed from Antonio Vivaldi's *The Four Seasons* by Max Richter. The 1st section is *Emergence*, the 2nd section is *Segregated*, the 3rd section is *Unceasing*, and the 4th section is *Explosive*. It was the inspiration for the new work.

What has the rehearsal process been like for this new work?

A new work like *Motion in String* requires several months of hard training and rehearsals. In the first 6 to 8 weeks, I work on creating the movements and teaching the choreography to the dancers. The following 6 to 8 weeks leading up to the performance, we focus extensively on the details of the flow and quality of the movements as well as constantly developing characters. I want the dancers to be able to execute the work comfortably and dance freely on the stage.

It was such a fun process to choreograph *Motion in String*. The music is constructed with so many layers to it that creates great opportunities for me to develop different dynamics and quality of movements and to form characters and relationships that connect between the dancers.

Why did you select the title Hear Me Now! for the overall performance?

We're doing 4 very different works and *Hear Me Now!* seems to work with them all. A couple of the pieces have important messages that we all need to 'Hear' that can make a significant impact on the audience, while others are fun and delightful like a piece taking a light-hearted look at how we are all addicted out our smart phones. *Hear Me Now!* just works!

What do you want audiences to come away with from Hear Me Now!?

Hear Me Now! is a gathering of four very distinctively different works. Some works are enriched with their own depth, ideas, and meanings. Others are packed with humor and playfulness. We hope the audience will leave the performance feeling inspired and uplifted and find their own way to interpret and translate the works, seeing their own lives reflected it.

Founded in 2011, Gin Dance has taken leaps and bounds in the area's professional dance scene. Atlas' Intersections Festival Provides One-Stop Shop for Arts

Dancers and actors and poets—that is what's in store for those who attend Atlas' Intersections Festival in D.C. from Feb. 20 to March 7, which connects audiences with the most exciting new forms of community-inspired art. Among the variety of performers will be a number of Northern Virginia art groups including the Gin Dance Company and Arts on the Horizon.

The Gin Dance Company was founded by Shu-Chen Cuff, a Taiwanese immigrant who came to the United States to study dance. After relocating to the D.C. area and dancing in professional groups for years, Cuff decided to set out on her own.

"I like to create my own things and my own styles and share them with the audience," says Cuff. "Hopefully it can help a lot more people appreciate art and open up their vision."

With her experience in both modern ballet and traditional Chinese dance and movements, Cuff certainly will be bringing that unique style to audiences at Intersections.

Arts on the Horizon is also creating new opportunities for its audience, but the audience itself is what makes the group an interesting component to the festival. Taking a page from European groups, Arts on the Horizon is the first theater company in the U.S. that performs plays exclusively for children from 0-6.

"There's just nothing here in the area with a full focus on this age group, and there are so many kids who I think would benefit from programs such as these," says Michelle Kozlak, founder and producing art director for Arts on the Horizon.

Each of the company's shows, which are all original productions, centers on themes important to children's development and introduces them to new forms of art. Its show for Intersections, "Sunny and Licorice," teaches the kids how to live with others and features two orangutans and a tap-dancing number. Many of the plays are also nonverbal to make sure they suit the varying levels of language development of young children.

Having performed at last year's Intersections Festival, both Gin Dance Company and Arts on

"To be able to give an opportunity for families, especially with young children, to be able to participate in the festival," says Kozlak. "Hopefully they'll come back as their kids get older or even the parents themselves come to the shows for adults."

"It can be really inspiring after seeing the performance and go back to your normal life," says Cuff. "You never know how art can change people's lives."

ance is an amazing art form that you can deliver stories, ideas, meanings and emotions through body language. It's a very powerful thing," said Shu-Chen Cuff, artistic director of the Fairfax County-based Gin Dance Company. The company will be performing in the coming weeks at Reston's CenterStage and then at the Reston Multicultural Festival.

Gin Dance Company's original works reflect Shu-Chen's Asian heritage melded with contemporary Western dance movement: a flowing fusion of Asian and Western cultural artistry. She was born in Taiwan and resides in Reston.

"Choreographing a dance is like making a cake. You have an idea or image in your head of how it should look and taste, then you start adding layers and decorations onto the cake to complete the product. As choreography, the movements, the music, the costume, and the props/sets are the layers and

decorations on the cake," said Shu-Chen. "Inspirations come from evervwhere."

Sometimes listening to an interesting piece of music such as Arvo Part's classically inspired, minimalist piano work "Spiegel im Spiegel" can bring an idea for her work. Other times, she has a dance vision and then searches for the right music.

At the CenterStage performance,

the Gin Dance Company will perform original works such as "The Teller," a work about fate and des-

It was created "to deliver an awakening message for people to take charge and tell your own story in life and not to let someone else do it for you. ... We are masters of our own destiny and we shape our own futures," continued Shu-Chen.

The thought provoking "The

Core" was inspired by lights; their design and their impact on the mind. "I explore through dance the interconnectivity between all things in the universe. Our inner strength, emotion, and energy can affect the people around us.

We are not alone. ... We are all connected." Another piece, "Dear Mr. Cooper," is about giving oneself the "second chance" to express appreciation to someone special,

Dance is ephemeral. One minute you are absorbing the movement, lights, costumes and sound, and the next it is all gone. But K Dance's 15th annual Yes! National Dance Invitational leaves you with visual images you won't soon forget.

Kaye Weinstein Gary, producer and artistic director of K Dance, had a clear focus for this show: to create, to exist, to bring into being.

Featuring choreographers from Northern Virginia, Philadelphia, Houston, Los Angeles and Richmond, the show truly exhibits its focus and achieves its goal with the highlights being Chisena Danza and BodyTraffic.

Gin Dance Company, from Northern Virginia, featuring choreography by Shu-Chen Cuff set to music by Patrick Burke and R. Luke Dubois opened the show, immediately placing audience expectations high.

The sharp isolations and angles contrasted with smooth, long lines revealed intelligent and creative dance composition. The sporadic fidgets of the dancers were a welcomed surprise, and there was just enough unison and variation throughout the piece.

Shu-Chen Cuff's beautiful facial expressions and detailed finger movements reminded the audience how lovely details can be.

Chisena Danza, from Philadelphia, featured choreography by Melissa Chisena, who also performed the piece flawlessly. The music was created live on stage where the audience watched Jonathan Cannon tap out rhythms with his hands and feet while Katonya Mosley used breath, words and sounds to accompany the dancing.

The collaboration was stunning — from the way the lights struck Chisena's bare back revealing a dancer's sculpted muscles to the way Mosley inhaled and exhaled the breath-work score while intertwining sounds and words. You simply cannot look

hrough dance, we deliver our ideas, stories and emotions across without saying a word," said Shu-Chen Cuff, artistic director of the Reston-based Gin Dance Company. "Regardless what country you are from and what language you speak, the audience can hear your voice by watching the body movements expressing with a different rhythm, different energy and different dynamic. Founded in 2011, Gin Dance has taken leaps and bounds in the area's professional dance scene. 
The event includes a new work by Gin company member Elizabeth Lucrezio.


